

Headline Inflation: Year-on-Year Changes for Mar 2023 compared to Mar 2022



increases were observed for salt, bbq sauce and ketchup. The index for Oils and Fats rose 15.1% over the year and the index for Milk, Cheese and Eggs increased by 13.2%. The index for Meat and Meat Products rose 10.9% over the last year as five of the six subcategories increased.

The indexes for Vegetables, Meat and Meat Products, and Food Products N.E.C are the three food groups' indexes influencing the increase in the Food

The All Items index rose 4.6% for the twelve months ending March 2023
The Food index rose 10.0% over the past twelve months. The index for Food

Products N.E.C recorded the largest increase of 21.6%. Average price

The indexes for Vegetables, Meat and Meat Products, and Food Products N.E.C are the three food groups' indexes influencing the increase in the Food index. The index for Vegetables accounted for 19.1% of the change while Meat and Meat contributed 18.8%. The index for Food Products N.E.C added 16.7%. The other groups' driving the increase ranged from Fruit (2.8%) to Bread and Cereals (15.4%).

The index for All Items Less Food and Energy rose 4.4%. Nine of the twelve major indexes remained the same as was the period ending February 2023. The index for Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco, and Narcotics increased 0.3% over the twelve months. The index for Transport declined 0.9% as a result of a reduction in the index for Operations of Personal Transport Equipment which fell 7.5%. The decline was attributed to the reduction in the both gasoline and diesel price at the pumps. Gasoline declined from \$15.70 to \$13.99 while diesel reduced from \$15.50 to 14.25 per gallon.

The Monthly Consumer Price Index increased by 0.2% for the month ending March 2023.

The index for Food declined by 0.2% over the month. The index for Fish and Seafood fell 2.9% over the month. The index for Fruit decreased by 2.2% and the index for Vegetables declined by 1.2%.

In contrast, the index for Milk, Cheese, and Eggs rose by 4.2% after declining 3.9% the previous month. The increase was largely attributed to a 6.3% increase in the index for Preserved Milk and Other Milk Products. The index for Food Products N.E.C rose 2.8%.

The index for All Items Less Food and Energy increased 0.4% in over the same period. The Transport Services index rose 4.7% resulting from 5.6% increase in the index for Passenger Transport by Air. The index for Furnishings, Household Equipment, and Routine Household Maintenance increased by 0.4%. In contrast, the index for Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco, and Narcotics decreased by 0.9%.



¹ Outlets refer to the businesses where prices are collected (e.g supermarkets). The same outlets are used for Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages, Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco & Narcotics and some Miscellaneous Goods and Services

What is the Consumer Price Index?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a statistical indicator of changes in the general level of prices of consumer goods and services purchased by private households. The CPI measures price movements of a fixed quality and quantity of goods and services. The mix of these consumer goods and services comprising the CPI are referred to as a "shopping basket." In constructing this "shopping basket", the selected goods and services are organised first by commodity type. They are then divided into sections, then sub-groups and then assigned to a major expenditure category. The Antigua and Barbuda CPI has 26 sections, 30 sub-groups and 12 major categories.

What is the Base Period?

The base period (base year) is the time period that is used as a reference point for measuring the price change of goods and services. The base period for the Antigua and Barbuda CPI is January 2019.

The base period index is represented as 100.0. (Usually presented as 2019 = 100). So for instance, if the April 2020 CPI for chicken legs is 167.1, then it means that the price for chicken legs has gone up by 67.1% since 2019. Similarly, if the January 2020 CPI for bread is 93.1, then the price of bread has dropped by 6.9% compared to its price in 2019.

What is Inflation?

Inflation is the process of rising prices, resulting in diminishing purchasing power of a given amount of money. There are three expressions of price changes:

- year-on-year (the inflation rate)
- month-to-month
- annual average (or annualised average)

The annual average CPI is the arithmetic mean of the CPIs of the 12 months.

What are Weights?

Weights are "expenditure shares" that is the proportion of total spending on various consumer goods and services, for example, 20% on rent, 25% food, 15% transport, 10% on utilities and so on. the CPI weights are a expression of household's spending on consumer goods and services.

The weights were drawn from a survey of a sample of households in each month of 2006 (the weight base period). Each household in thesample kept a record of their expenditure for one month. Once completed, the expenditures were added to determine expenditure shares per 1000; theseare the weights.

The current weights indicate that, households would spend the most on *Accommodation* (218.3 out of 1000) followed by *Food* (214.2) and *Transportation and Communication* (153.5). Households spend the least on *Alcoholic Drink and Tobacco* (1.6).



Table 3 outlines the distribution of price movements for four inflation periods:

Mar 2023 compared to Mar 2022 Feb 2023 compared to Feb 2022 Mar 2023 compared to Feb 2023

In Mar 2023 compared to Mar 2022, 1 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded price decreases, while 11 recorded price increases. 17 of the 23 subgroup levels also recorded price increases for some of the items that fall in that level. These collective increases and decreases would account for the magnitude and direction of the current inflation rate. 0 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded no price changes.
