The All Items Index increased 6.6% for the twelve months ending August 2023; a larger increase than the 5.0% increase for the tewlve months ending in July 2023. The index for Transport was the largest contributor the All Items increase, accounting for 26.0% of the increase. Also contributing to the August annual increase was the advancement in the Communication index which rose for thirty-two consecutive month.

The index for Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages increased 3.8% with the Food Index increasing 3.6% over the last twelve months. Price changes in the nine food indexes were split with six increase and three decreases. The index for Bread and Cereals rose by 9.1% and accounted for almost 40% of the food increase. The subcategory index of Other Cereals, Flour and Other Products increased 13.7% over the year. The index for Milk, Cheese and Egg accounted for the second largest contribution of 22.8%. The index advanced 10.4% over the twelve period. The index for Vegetables decrease 1.3% in August after increasing 9.5% in July. The decline was attributed to 11.7% decline in the index for Fresh or Chilled Potatoes. Another notable decrease was the index for Meats and Meat Product which also declined by 1.3%.

The index for All Items Less Food and Energy index rose 8.6% over the past twelve months. The index for Transport Services rose 34.2%. Influencing the increase was index for Passenger Transport by Air which rose 39.5%. Other indexes with notable increases over the last year include Restaurants and Hotels (+30.8%),Communication (+13.1%),Clothing and Footwear (+8.0%), Miscellaneous Goods and Services (5.5%) and Furnishing Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance (5.3%).

The Monthly Consumer Price Index rose 1.4% in August 2023 after increasing 0.8% in the previous month.

The index for Food declined 1.6% in August. Seven of nine food groups posted decreases over the one month period. The index for Vegetables declined 5.3% in August as all three subcategories declined. The index for Frozen, Preserved or Processed Vegetables declined 6.6%, while the index for Fresh or Chilled Potatoes fell 5.4%. Also declining was the index for Fresh or Chilled Vegetables (-3.3%). Other notable food groups decreases include Fruit (-3.7%), Sugars, Jam, Honey, Chocolate and Confectionery (-1.3%) and Meat and Meat Products (-1.2%). In contrast, the index for Food Products N.E.C rose 2.2% and the index for Bread and Cereals increased 1.0%

The index for All Items Less Food and Energy rose 2.4% in August after rising 0.9% in July. The index was largely driven by a 28.6% increase in the index for Transport Services. The index for Alcoholic Beverages, Tobacco and Narcotics rose 0.9% after declining 2.2% the previous month. The indexes for Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels declined 0.2%, while both the indexes for Miscellaneous Goods and Services and Furnishings, Household equipment and Routine Maintenance both declined 0.1% over the period. The remaining indexes remained unchanged.

#### What is the Consumer Price Index?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a statistical indicator of changes in the general level of prices of consumer goods and services purchased by private households. The CPI measures price movements of a fixed quality and quantity of goods and services. The mix of these consumer goods and services comprising the CPI are referred to as a "shopping basket." In constructing this "shopping basket", the selected goods and services are organised first by commodity type. They are then divided into sections, then sub-groups and then assigned to a major expenditure category. The Antigua and Barbuda CPI has 26 sections, 30 sub-groups and 12 major categories.

#### What is the Base Period?

The base period (base year) is the time period that is used as a reference point for measuring the price change of goods and services. The base period for the Antigua and Barbuda CPI is January 2019.

The base period index is represented as 100.0. (Usually presented as 2019 = 100). So for instance, if the April 2020 CPI for chicken legs is 167.1, then it means that the price for chicken legs has gone up by 67.1% since 2019. Similarly, if the January 2020 CPI for bread is 93.1, then the price of bread has dropped by 6.9% compared to its price in 2019.

#### What is Inflation?

Inflation is the process of rising prices, resulting in diminishing purchasing power of a given amount of money. There are three expressions of price changes:

- year-on-year (the inflation rate)
- month-to-month
- annual average (or annualised average)

The annual average CPI is the arithmetic mean of the CPIs of the 12 months.

#### What are Weights?

Weights are "expenditure shares" that is the proportion of total spending on various consumer goods and services, for example, 20% on rent, 25% food, 15% transport, 10% on utilities and so on. the CPI weights are a expression of household's spending on consumer goods and services.

The weights were drawn from a survey of a sample of households in each month of 2006 (the weight base period). Each household in thesample kept a record of their expenditure for one month. Once completed, the expenditures were added to determine expenditure shares per 1000; theseare the weights.

The current weights indicate that, households would spend the most on *Accommodation* (218.3 out of 1000) followed by *Food* (214.2) and *Transportation and Communication* (153.5). Households spend the least on *Alcoholic Drink and Tobacco* (1.6).

# Table 3 outlines the distribution of price movements for four inflation periods:

Aug 2023 compared to Aug 2022 Jul 2023 compared to Jul 2022 Aug 2023 compared to Jul 2023

In Aug 2023 compared to Aug 2022, 0 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded price decreases, while 12 recorded price increases. 13 of the 23 subgroup levels also recorded price increases for some of the items that fall in that level. These collective increases and decreases would account for the magnitude and direction of the current inflation rate. 0 of the 12 main expenditure categories recorded no price changes.
